The Revd Canon Paul Hardingham looks back on the year that changed the world.

'One Year On'

It was just over a year ago that the WHO discussed the coronavirus that was starting to spread around the world. None of us could have foreseen the devastating effect on our world, with over 80 million people infected and nearly two million deaths. How has the pandemic challenged our faith, as we look back over the last year?

Firstly, it has forced us to face up to the *reality of our situation*. We cannot underestimate the health, social and economic effects of the virus on our lives, churches and communities. We have learned how to do church online, but the future shape of church life is uncertain!

As the apostle Paul writes: 'We are hard pressed on every side, but not crushed; perplexed, but not in despair; persecuted, but not abandoned; struck down, but not destroyed. We always carry around in our body the death of Jesus' (2 Cor 4:8-10).

The pandemic has challenged so much of what we take for granted, but also demonstrated that God is alongside to help us in these circumstances

Secondly, alongside the fear and uncertainty of this year, we have also learned to find **new faith and hope in Jesus**. The experience of Jesus' death and His resurrection provides a pattern for us in facing the future: 'so that His life may also be revealed in our mortal body. So then, death is at work in us, but life is at work in you.' (2 Cor 4:10-12).

During the season of Lent, as we anticipate the events at Easter, it's good to focus on the promise of sharing in the death and resurrection of Jesus. As we consider our present struggles, are we ready to surrender them to Jesus? May the hope of Easter Day take us forward into the coming year.

A Word from Wales

It is imposible to believe that it is a year now since Marilyn and I said goodbye to all the wonderful people at St Mary's Chapel and turned ourselves out onto fresh pasture in Wales. The followed a year of producing a magazine remotely, while living through the first pandemic in a hundred years.

I remembered my father telling me about his experiences as a young boy living in South West Africa (now Namibia) during the Spanish Flu pandemic of 1918 -1920. He was eleven when his pandemic started, thirteen when the plague burnt out. With the only medical services available being both limited and primitive, life was truly a lottery back then.

Throughthis pandemic we have had video phones to maintain contact with family. Unable to go out, Netflix, Prime and countless programs on TV. Unable to get to a book shop, Kindle books have kept me entertained. And I haven't yet got around to mentioning the internet.

I have been exploring Wales via the internet, finding all the places we can visit once we are allowed out again. I also need to start working on learning to at least pronounce Welsh place names correctly.

As for medical attention. I have so far recived an innoculation for flu, shingles, pneumonia and the first of my Covid injections. I have started to feel like a Welsh whale, being harpooned by the nurses.

Yet despite the fear of the pandemic, and the crass stupidity of so many people, I am over joyed by the apparent outbreak of goodness I see everywhere.

In the innoculation centre I met a Church in Wales vicar, who had spent over ten hours that day working as a volunteer, helping people receive their injection. Cheerful despite his tiredness, I was amazed at the way he could be where he was needed as if by telepathy. He strenghted my resolve to get back to church as soon as it was allowed.



Living by the Law

In her US radio show, Dr Laura Schlesinger stated that, as an observant Orthodox Jew, she found homosexuality an abomination. According to Leviticus 18:22, it cannot be condoned under any circumstance.

The following response is an open letter to Dr Laura, penned by a US resident. It is both amusing and informative:

Dear Dr Laura:

Thank you for doing so much to educate people regarding God's Law. I have learned a great deal from your show, and I try to share that knowledge with as many people as possible. When someone tries to defend the homosexual lifestyle, for example, I simply remind them that Leviticus 18:22 clearly states it to be an abomination ... End of debate.

I do need some advice from you, however, regarding some other elements of God's Laws and how to follow them.

1st March St David's Day, A Time for Daffodils

1st March is St David's Day, and it's time for the Welsh to wear daffodils or leeks. Shakespeare called this custom 'an honourable tradition begun upon an honourable request' - but nobody knows the reason. Why should anyone have ever 'requested' that the Welsh wear leeks or daffodils to honour their patron saint? It's a mystery!



We do know that David - or Dafydd - of Pembrokeshire was a monk and bishop of the 6th century. In the 12th century he was made patron of Wales, and he has the honour of being the only Welsh saint to be canonised and culted in the

Mothering Sunday, 4th Sunday in Lent - 14th March:

There is an old Jewish saying: God could not be everywhere, and therefore He made mothers.

Mother Church, Mother Earth, Mother of the Gods - our human mothers - all of them have been part of the celebration of 'Mothering Sunday' - as the fourth Sunday in Lent is affectionately known. It has been celebrated in the UK since at least the 16^{th} century.

In Roman times, great festivals were held every Spring to honour Cybele, Mother of all the Gods. Other pagan festivals in honour of Mother Earth were also celebrated. With the arrival of Christianity, the festival became one honouring Mother Church.

During the Middle Ages, young people apprenticed to craftsmen or working as 'live-in' servants were allowed only one holiday a year on which to visit their families, which is how 'Mothering Sunday' got its name. This special day became a day of family rejoicing, and the Lenten fast was broken. In some places the day was called Simnel Day, because of the sweet cakes called simnel cakes traditionally eaten on that day.

In recent years the holiday has changed, and in many ways now resembles the American Mother's Day, with families

going out to Sunday lunch and generally making a fuss of their mother on the day.

St Patrick, beloved apostle to Ireland 17th March

St Patrick is the patron saint of Ireland. If you've ever been in New York on St Patrick's Day, you'd think he was the patron saint of New York as well... the flamboyant parade is full of American/Irish razzmatazz.

It's all a far cry from the hard life of this 5th century humble Christian who became in time both bishop and apostle of Ireland. Patrick was born the son of a town councillor in the west of England, between the Severn and the Clyde. But as a young man he was captured by Irish pirates, kidnapped to Ireland, and reduced to slavery. He was made to tend his master's herds.

Desolate and despairing, Patrick turned to prayer. He found God was there for him, even in such desperate circumstances. He spent much time in prayer, and his faith grew and deepened, in contrast to his earlier years, when he "knew not the true God".

Then, after six gruelling, lonely years he was told in a dream he would soon go to his own country. He either escaped or was freed, made his way to a port 200 miles away and eventually persuaded some sailors to take him with them away from Ireland.

After various adventures in other lands, including nearstarvation, Patrick landed on English soil at last, and returned to his family. But he was much changed. He had enjoyed his life of plenty before; now he wanted to devote the rest of his life to Christ. Patrick received some form of training for the priesthood, but not the higher education he really wanted.

But by 435, well-educated or not, Patrick was badly needed. Palladius' mission to the Irish had failed, and so the Pope sent Patrick back to the land of his slavery. He set up his see at Armagh and worked principally in the north. He urged the Irish to greater spirituality, set up a school, and made
